


#1 Barrier to expansion in Basin-Bound




The most cited determinant of successful ED programming is the capacity of the local ED community (gov't, admiral NGOs)

In the Basin-Boundary, only 17% of supplies are sourced locally










Urban-Centricity

Again, capacity drives delivery of social and cultural programming




















Higher unemployment

Prevents us from seeing opportunity










The Roots: Capacity (or Ad-Hocery)
