

Business Retention & Expansion



- Over 600 businesses surveyed, with *interests in 42 communities
- 30+ partnerships (local government, Community Futures, Chambers of Commerce, Development Boards, provincial government, provincial economic development association, Columbia Basin Trust)
 - Over 140 hours on development of implementation tools (regional partnership model, manuals, instructional videos)
- Over 700 hours of direct research support and over 150 hours of training
- 7 faculty and students involved
 - 5 faculty
 - 2 co-op students

- 3. In what ways can locally collected data on businesses inform local and regional level planning?







Geographic Corridors: Where are you?





















BRE as a mechanism to increase communications across key ED stakeholders


Local government has an opportunity to hear from the business community



Capacity Requirement: Low/Medium

Conditions / Considerations

- A dedicated EDP is an ingredient in ED capacity (elevates from low to medium/high), otherwise manage expectations on what is possible = opportunity for EDNP to support lower capacity communities?
- Not all actions require high capacity building trust and opening up conversations have huge value
- Need for local government training identified, not all are convinced they have a role in economic development
- Limited follow-up with businesses = emerging opportunity for the EDNP?

RDI and **BRE**

- Continue with related applied research and support to BRE implementation, analysis and reporting efforts
- Release BRE data and BRE Briefs highlighting key regional / corridor findings
- What happens to BRE at the end of the pilot in March 2015?
