

The Last 10 Years: Growth Corridors Stabilize Population in the Basin Boundary

As highlighted in Chart 1, data from Census 2011 reveals the population of the Columbia Basin Boundary Region¹ has returned to 2001 levels, rebounding from a decline in population of 3,704 as reported in the 2006 census.



As Chart 2 reveals, the communities that experienced the highest levels growth over the last 10 years were Nelson, Cranbrook, Castlegar, Salmo and Creston. The highest levels of population decline over the last 10 years occurred mainly in the northern part of the region, including Revelstoke, Golden, Nakusp and Valemount. The larger communities in the Kootenay Boundary Region District also experienced decline, including the Greater Trail Area, Rossland, and Grand Forks (in the Boundary Corridor). Nakusp and the Slocan Valley has also experienced significant decline over the last 10 years.

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Table 1 below provides detailed data for each community and Regional District (RD) Area in the West Kootenay Corridor. The population of this corridor increased by 812 (1.3%) over the last 10 years. Strong growth in the Nelson Area, Castlegar Area and the City of Trail offset decline in the rest of the Corridor.

It is interesting to note the Regional District (RD) Areas adjacent to Nelson and Castlegar are growing right along with their neighbouring communities. The Regional District of Central Kootenay (RDCK) Areas I and J increased by 200 people in the last 10 years paralleling the growth of the neighbouring larger community of Castlegar (231 increase, 3.0%). RDCK Areas E, F, and G and the community of Salmo collectively increased by 591 paralleling the growth of neighbouring Nelson (912 increase, 8.9%). While the City of Trail grew by 106 people (1.4%) over 10 years, population declines in the adjacent



communities of Rossland (-90), Warfield (-39), Montrose (-37) and Fruitvale (-9) and RD Areas A (-139) and B (-188) off set this growth for an overall decrease of -396 (-2.1%) in the Greater Trail and Rossland Area.

Table 2 below provides detailed data for the Cranbrook-Kimberley-Creston growth corridor in the south-eastern part of the Basin Boundary region. This corridor increased by 858 people over the last 10 years. The communities of Cranbrook, (802, 4.2%) Creston (511, 9.6%) and Kimberley (168, 2.5%) as well as RDCK Area C (85, 6.2%) fueled population growth while the majority of adjacent RD areas decreased. There was also a slight decrease in the First Nations population in the region over the last 10 years (-13, 0.01%). It is interesting to note that population declines in RDs adjacent to Creston cut this area's population growth by more than half while population decline in Regional District of East Kootenay (RDEK) Area E offset Kimberley's growth completely. Population decline in RD Areas adjacent to Cranbrook only minimally offset this community's growth by 132 people.

As detailed in Table 3, a number of corridors (and the more isolated non-corridor communities of Revelstoke and Valemount²) experienced a decrease in population over the last 10 years. The Revelstoke Area experienced the largest population decrease (-434, -5.6%), followed by the Columbia Valley Corridor (-327, -2.1%), the Elk Valley Corridor (-312, -2.5%), the Boundary Corridor (-309, -2.6%), and Valemount (-223, -21.9%).

Upon further examination of the population changes within corridors, some tensions are apparent with respect to growth alongside decline. For example, in the Columbia Valley the communities of Invermere, Radium Hot Springs and RDEK Area F experienced a combined increase of 291 but population decline occurring mainly in the Golden Area (-389), RDEK Area G (-223) and Canal Flats (-39) greatly offset any gains for a net decrease of -327 (-2.1%). In the Elk Valley region, the population increase in RDEK Area A

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(62) was offset by a collective decline of -374 in Elkford, Sparwood and Fernie for a net decrease of -312 (-2.5%). The Boundary Corridor also experienced a mix of growth and decline over the last 10 years with Greenwood and Midway collectively increasing by 78 and Grand Forks and Regional District of Kootenay Boundary (RDKB) Areas C, D and E collectively decreasing by -387 for a net decrease of -309 (-2.6%). It is interesting to note that 2011 Census data reveals the Columbia Valley has a high percentage of second homes (56% of total dwellings) concentrated mainly Radium Hot Springs (71%) and RDEK Area F (70%). The Boundary Corridor also has a high percentage of second homes (41%) concentrated mainly in RDKB Area E (75%) and RDKB Area C (59%). This suggests a high number of second homeowners live at least part of the year in the region; these 'non-usual residents' are not included in the region's Census count.

Population trends in the region over the last 10 years not only reveal decline in the northern (Revelstoke, Golden & Valemount) and western (Boundary) parts of the region, data also reveals the population declined in the majority of RD Areas and increased in the larger centres. Simply put, people appear to be leaving the more rural areas and either moving into the region's larger, more southern communities (Nelson, Castlegar, Trail, Creston, Cranbrook) and / or moving out of the region. The larger communities are attracting residents from the RD areas and / or residents from outside of the region. Future Census data will help to clarify patterns related to inter and intra migration as well as immigration.
